clear this talk is working off a definition of freedom that is lacking or at least not Christian. In the wider culture, freedom may well have come to mean freedom from imposition or even inconvenience, freedom from having individual choices impacted by communal decisions.

For the Christian, however, I believe freedom is not primarily freedom from, it is freedom for and freedom to. In Christ, we are free to live for our neighbor. We are free to serve one another. We recognize that living in a way that endangers others is not an enactment of true freedom; it is putting the self above others, something against which the Scriptures warn us continually. For Christians, sacrifice for others is not an infringement, but a spiritual discipline and key religious value. Another way to think of sacrifice is making an offering, an offering of oneself for the good and protection of others. Afterall, that is precisely what Jesus made of his life, a holy and sacred offering.

One of the many tragedies of this time is that seemingly everything has become politicized, where basic actions get put in one of two neatly defined camps, ideologies, or affiliations. The problem is life is more complex, issues are more nuanced, and people are more diverse than this simplistic binary thinking. A functional society has to be able to agree on certain basic facts in order to be able to come to decisions for the common good. As people of faith, we can be constructive participants, both by our individual actions and by engaging in the public sphere, holding leaders accountable for governing in good faith, with particular concern for the vulnerable.

A vaccination, a mask, these are offerings we can make for our neighbors if not ourselves. They are ones I have made and will continue to make.

WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?

Like many things of late, our mission trip was more of a mission "trip." In other words, we didn't go anywhere. We stayed at the church and mostly went to work and see our friends in Marin City. While it was certainly different, it gave us an opportunity to reconsider one of the more familiar lessons of the Bible.

Jesus said that "to love your neighbor as yourself," is the second most important command of all. While it ranks second behind loving God (according to Jesus), it also is the summation of all the other teachings that came before Jesus.

A good question to ask then is, "Who is my neighbor?" When Jesus was asked this question, he responded with the parable of the Good Samaritan. Essentially, in Jesus' telling, the most unlikely person to care for someone in need is a good neighbor. The person we are to love, therefore, is simply someone in need ... regardless of our relation to them.

We tend to think of loving our neighbors in the big picture sense. We're supposed to be nice to everyone. We're supposed to care about what's going on around the world. While that is true, the parable itself directs our attention to more immediate matters. In the parable, the word "neighbor" makes us think about the people near to us.

So this year, instead of loving the people who live hundreds of miles away, we dedicated a week to considering what it means to love our neighbors who are:

- Across the hall (at school, home, or office)
- Across the street (in our neighborhoods)
- · Across town (around Marin and the Bay Area)
- Across the country
- Around the world

We hope this can serve as inspiration for all of us. Hopefully we can continue to travel and contribute to the needs of those far away. Hopefully we'll also recognize the gift of serving those who are closest to us. Yes, even those next door.

IT IS TIME TO START SINGING AGAIN

What a long, fraught time this has been for singers and other performing artists. Perhaps we'll work in more ways for the congregation as a whole to join us in singing.

The annual In-Gathering Brunch is back better than ever this year on **Sunday, September 12** following worship. It will feature food prepared in our brandnew kitchen as well as dishes brought by some of our congregation's finest cooks.

Our In-Gathering celebration at Westminster has always been an important event on the calendar and it is the biggest all-church fellowship event of the year. For many years, it was primarily a potluck meal after the morning worship service. It has become more elaborate in recent years as the Congregational Life commission, which organizes and hosts the In-Gathering, has significantly expanded the brunch theme and now prepares all of



the main courses, several of which are becoming traditions themselves. People are still encouraged to bring a side dish to share, or they may make a donation to help cover the costs of the event. Some of those side dishes have long and storied reputations too, especially the various recipes of deviled eggs, of which there are never enough.



The In-Gathering is a long-enduring church tradition, originally conceived as a biblically-grounded thanksgiving celebration after the fall harvest, originally known as the Feast of the Tabernacles in ancient Jewish tradition. But as congregations have become less agriculturally-oriented over the years, In-Gathering celebrations have assumed other related and worthy themes surrounding our material blessings and the spiritual blessing of fellowship. At Westminster and at many other churches, the In-Gathering highlights the beginning of a new church year and celebrates the depth, breadth and closeness of our church community.

Despite the complexity of putting on an elaborate event such as this, especially coordinating the many hands and details involved, it is a labor of love and of respect for each individual's role in our church community. The reward is in seeing new and long-time members, visitors and guests, old and young alike, dining and laughing together while enjoying delicious food and getting to know each other better. There is no better glue to help strengthen and hold us together. And no better way to introduce Westminster to someone new.

PEDAL FOR PROTEIN ("P4P")

For the past seven years a dedicated group of Presbyterian cyclists who reside in the Redwoods of the Presbytery, as we do, have organized and executed a remarkable fund raising program, Pedal for Protein ("P4P").

It has consisted of a week of riding for long distances to inspire fundraising in their home congregations. They have raised over \$300,000 to fund food banks on the North Coast. Riders from WPC have been steady participants, usually for one day and 50 miles each.

In 2020 the event was canceled as a big ride and switched to stationary bikes and day rides. WPC fielded 12 enthusiastic riders who logged 676 miles and raised over \$1,000.

We are going to plunge in again this year with a combination of individual efforts at home and a group on the road on Saturday, September 25.
