In the 43rd chapter of Isaiah, the prophet records God saying, "when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you." That line, of course, was not written with California's fires in mind. Some here have been burned, some homes consumed. Even in its original context, Isaiah may have been working on a metaphorical level in addition to reflecting on a literal deliverance. That said, the fires of the past weeks have given us much to consider in terms of presence, the divine and our own.

It may be hard to see the presence of God in such destruction. To find it, some turn to firefighters, first responders, and even utility workers, "the helpers" as Mr. Rogers used to refer to them. Surely their efforts (cont...)

are those of heroes if not angels in our midst.

I stop short of assigning God's discernable will to everything that happens. I do believe in times like these, though, that lessons arise for us if we are open to them. As we are learning on the church staff with our recent relocation of the office to Larkspur for the renovation, a change of environment reveals a lot about how we've been living.

I wonder what the power outages in the face of fire dangers revealed to you. What did it reveal to you about the pace of our life, slowed if not stopped by limited access to power, gas, and communications? What did it reveal about our connection or lack thereof to our neighbors? What did it reveal about what's most important, and as a result what is less so? What did it reveal about what usually goes unnoticed in your life and what gets more of your attention than it should? What did it reveal about inequality in our communities, how people of different means have vastly different ranges of options of what to do in such situations?

I have found the power outages a powerful time to reflect on these questions. I feel moved to live more simply, live more slowly, live more connected – not waiting until the next crisis to connect, but to build strong neighborhoods in advance. I feel more convinced that kindness and decency is the fabric of community. I feel like my devices could use more time off that I might be more "on" when in the presence of loved ones. I feel that darkness and quiet are undervalued goods.

I pray for those more negatively affected by the fires than I—the people, the creatures, and the land. I give thanks for the presence I experienced in the midst of it all. In the end, maybe Isaiah's writings didn't refer to our times, but perhaps the one from whom these writings flow did have us in mind. Maybe a piece of God's presence in the fires, as in the waters of chaos, is in the revealing.

Several times over the past few years we have programmed a service of lessons and carols during Advent. This service is patterned after a Christmas Eve service established at King's College Chapel in 1918 and is now broadcast each year to millions of people around the world.

The KCC tradition includes choral selections that reflect on readings from the Bible that trace the story of God's redeeming love from the older testament through the Gospels' birth narrative. The opening carol is always 'Once in Royal David's City', and since 1982 there is always a new, specially commissioned carol.

We haven't always observed the part about commissioning a new carol, but this year I decided I'd like to write something specifically for this

service. To my surprise, my muse was very keen on this notion and blessed me with the inspiration for not one, but three new works.

It is my custom to have three of the carols be sung by the congregation, three by the full choir and three by small ensembles. This year, two of the choir pieces and one of the ensemble pieces will be premiere performances, and a second ensemble piece is one I wrote for the service four years ago. In a few more years, perhaps I'll have set the entire service.

May this service bring you a respite from the bustling pace of the holiday season, and help us all recall with gratitude the amazing gift of the Word made flesh.

### MY WAR AGAINST NUMBERS

We'd just returned from a mission trip (this is several years ago) and everyone was buzzing. Our spirits were so high because everything we were hoping for happened. The internal conflict within the youth group got resolved and new friendships were forged. People who hadn't been able to open themselves up to have their souls mended found healing. We came as broken individuals and a group and returned home whole as individuals and as a group. We saw brokenness and found great hope in knowing that our talents could make things better.

The next day I came to the office and I was still processing how the trip went. I was still searching for the words to describe how the Spirit had moved in our midst. Most of what I was thinking was vague as I was still trying to make sense of it all myself. I replayed brief moments: We found a company to furnish someone's entire home. One of our youth who had difficulty with substance abuse opened up to the group about it asking for help. More and more these memories came in and out of focus.

The first series of questions I got upon returning to the office made me wonder if anybody would understand. "How was your trip? [immediately followed by] "How many people went?" Can I be totally transparent with you? I hate that second question. I hate that question because I knew that after telling someone how many people came with us they'd be disappointed It was not many. And so, after telling them how many they replied, "Oh that's too bad." What?!

What do you mean, "that's too bad?"
Did you hear the story about the group coming together? Did you hear the part about people discovering their gifts of service? Did you hear the miraculous story about that single mom's house? Okay, I get it. I know. What they really meant was, "It's too bad not more people got to experience that." Yes, you're right. That is too bad. However, how do our youth and volunteers internalize those conversations?

In our youth ministry we talk a lot about not trying to chase numbers. According to the Exemplary Youth Ministry Study, which covered 7 denominations, size of the church and youth group did not matter in regard to long-term faith development. Further, size of the youth group didn't meet any of the criteria of the Sticky Faith study which looked for causal factors in faith development.

Some assume this means we don't want more youth. Wrong! We believe this church is a safe haven and benefit to anyone who would participate. To be frank, we do care about numerical growth but never at the expense of spiritual growth. Anecdotally, what I've learned is when your ministry is in a healthy place you can't help but find new people getting involved.

This year our Confirmation class is smaller than the last few. Please understand, when you see that smaller group up front pronouncing their intent to join our church family on their own volition know that while they may be shy (or not), be born into a year when birthrates were down (or not), or their youth pastor simply wasn't as intentional as getting more kids (eh hem, or not), you can express gratitude by your conversations and questions. Although, those conversations probably won't include,

"How many kids are there this year?"



We are waiting for the County of Marin Building Department to issue the building permit which allows the contractor to begin construction. In the meantime, the committee and the staff have been hard at work. The staff moved to the Redwoods Presbyterian Church at 110 Magnolia Avenue in Larkspur



#### WHAT DO POINSETTIAS HAVE TO DO WITH CHRISTMAS?

Poinsettias didn't arrive in the United States until the 19th century. The plant is named for the first U.S. Ambassador to Mexico, Dr. Joel Roberts Poinsett, who introduced the U.S. to the poinsettia in 1828, after discovering it in the wilderness in southern Mexico. Dr. Poinsett sent cuttings of the plant back to his South Carolina home. While it wasn't initially embraced, it caught on over the years, and by the 20th century it was a holiday mainstay. In fact, National Poinsettia Day is celebrated on Dec. 12, honoring both the plant and the man who brought it to America [source: University of Illinois].

So what does a poinsettia have to do with Christmas? One interpretation of the plant is as a symbol of the Star of Bethlehem, the heavenly body that led the magi to the place where Christ was born. Another is a Mexican legend that tells of a girl who could only offer weeds as a gift to Jesus on Christmas Eve. When she brought the weeds into her church, they blossomed into the beautiful red plants we know as poinsettias, and also known as Flores de Noche Buena in Mexico ("Flowers of the Holy Night").

This year we again offer the opportunity to donate Red Poinsettias to decorate our sanctuary. You may designate your donation "in honor of" or "in memory of." The name of one loved one or couple, per poinsettia plant, will be printed and available the last two Sundays of Advent. The cost of each poinsettia is \$20.

Look for the Poinsettia Order form in the pew pockets. You may use the pew offering envelopes to place your donation (with your order form) in the offering plate. If writing a check, please note "poinsettias" in the memo. For questions please contact: Sharon at **sharon\_terrill@me.com** 

Poinsettias may be taken home after the final Christmas Eve service or following the December 29 services. Otherwise, we will deliver them to a member of our community needing January cheer.
